RESEARCH EXPERIENCE

2021-2022 – SELF-TRANSCENDENCE, LIFE-SATISFACTION, & CAREER

DEVELOPMENT. Self-transcendence and life-satisfaction are relevant features in derivations of purpose and meaning. When related to career development, these components are important spiritual realities for religious career decision-makers. Self-transcendence points to influences in career decision-making that originate beyond the self (e.g., a divine summons); life-satisfaction underscores effects from common human interactions (e.g., existential wellness) on career decision-making. A review of the literature for spirituality and career development revealed three foci. These include spirituality as a motivational force via a calling, an integral feature of career interests and values, and a supportive role. Yet, investigations with samples from the United States considering self-transcendence as a spiritual calling in vocational matters are not recent; studies addressing life-satisfaction in occupational decision-making do not employ a multivariate approach. Further, few researchers have considered the influence of quest religious orientation on career development. Hence, using a sample of Midwest undergraduates self-reporting a high importance for religion (n = 290), we conducted an investigation to identify which of thirteen religious and spiritual variables (e.g., religious calling, spiritual well-being, religious orientations) would become predictors of three well-known career development constructs – vocational identity, career commitment, and career indecision. The college-aged participants were enrolled in a psychology seminar (i.e., eleven hours) which included a career planning battery. Findings from the correlational analyses revealed religious calling and existential wellbeing significantly related to most of the career variables; religious orientation constructs significantly related to only a few vocational constructs. Moreover, the standard regression analyses uncovered religious calling (i.e., self-transcendence) and existential well-being (i.e., life satisfaction) as consistent predictors of the vocational scales.

2020-2021 – REVIEWING THE ENNEAGRAM THROUGH THE LENS OF

PERSONALITY & RELIGION. The currently popular Enneagram is an ancient classification of human personality. Like other well-known deductive typologies, this model distinguishes groups of individuals sharing a similar lifestyle of adaptive and maladaptive tendencies. Although the Enneagram developed from narrative methodologies, there exists a paucity of empirical research supporting the enneatype descriptions. Some existent studies have examined relational connections between the Enneagrams and personality variables; researchers have investigated the validity of the nine types with the Millon, Myers-Briggs Type Indicator, the 16 Personality Factor Model, and the Five-Factor Model. Yet, most are not current and do not apply a multivariate approach. Moreover, employment of the subscales in the trait factor models has been scarce and few examine the influence of humanistic values (e.g., Maslow's selfactualization). Hence, using a sample of undergraduates (n = 67), we conducted a pilot study to identify variables from psychoanalytic, humanistic, and trait psychologies along with religious constructs relating to each Enneagram. Participants self-assessed their Enneagram type and completed a multivariate battery of personality and religious measures. Preliminary findings from correlational and regression analyses revealed a collection of traits and variables revealing explicit personality characteristics per Enneagram. On the average, 19 statistically significant correlations (i.e., \geq .4) along with six (range 3-9) statistically significant predictors emerged per

Enneagram. Within each set, we identified support for existent Enneagram descriptions from well-known enthusiasts and delineated suggestions for additional information per type.

2013-2021 – A FEASIBILITY STUDY ON AN ULTRA-BRIEF INTERVENTION FOR IMPROVING FRESHMEN'S EMOTONAL INTELLIGENCE. In 1990, Salovey and Mayer introduced emotional intelligence (EI). Thirty years later, interventions for EI improvement have proliferated. A literature review on studies dedicated to enhancing the EI of college students revealed a notable gap. When educational material for training sessions include all of the skills in an EI model, researchers usually utilize lengthy durations (i.e., 11-56 hours). Few successful investigations employ an ultra-brief (i.e., ≤ 1 hour) approach. The present study examined the feasibility of training with this timeframe using a sample of freshmen; their transitional challenges from high school to college mark them as an appropriate target population. Employing a quasi-experimental one-group pretest-posttest design, the recruited participants (n = 75) experienced an ultra-brief intervention highlighting the complete skill-set of the Ability Emotional Intelligence model. Findings from paired-samples T-tests indicated improvement transpired for three of five MSCEIT scores (i.e., perception, facilitation, total score) with modest effect sizes. Merits of this feasibility study are delineated via the five objectives suggested by Orsmond and Cohn. In addition, implications of the results and possible applications are proposed. [This is co-authored with Kris Pence and Abby Sutter, former psychology majors]

2013-2020 – BEHIND DISLIKE: ADAPTIVE PURPOSES FOR UNDERGRADUATES' NEGATIVE EMOTIONS IN THE CAREER DECISION-MAKING PROCESS. This study seeks to answer these research questions: Negative emotions offer what advantages to people? Which negative emotions are more frequently tapped in the career decision-making process (CDM) by undergraduates exploring career information?

Are there any noticeable differences as to which negative affect are elicited with self-assigned careers (Top 3) verses computer-generated careers (Top 10)? Do undergraduates report that there is an adaptive side to these negative emotions in the CDM process? How do negative emotions help undergraduates in the career decision-making process?

2013-2018 – UNDER THE SKIN: THE RELATIONSHIP OF RELIGIOUS CALLING & MOTIVATION & SPIRITUAL WELL-BEING WITH CAREER DEVELOPMENT.

This study seeks to answer these research questions: What are the relationships between the variables of religious calling and motivation & well-being with career development constructs? Restated -- what combination of religious calling and motivation variables would predict career development constructs for undergraduates?

2016-2017 – EDWARD A. PACE AND THE LEGITIMACY FOR STUDYING PSYCHOLOGY: A 19th CENTURY APOLOGY FOR THE 21st CENTURY. In the late 1800s, Edward A. Pace joined a movement defending the merit of scientific psychology. He along with several first generation American psychologists sought to gain public support for the new version of psychology by highlighting its scientific advances and social virtues relative to the older and familiar version, philosophical or rational psychology. Pace, a priest and scholar, targeted interested parties in the Catholic church and its academies laboring much like an

apologist to establish "the legitimacy for [studying experimental] psychology" (Elias, 2005, p. 3). His apologetic efforts in the 19th century offer rich insight into present-day criticism of psychology by fellow Christians – in particular, ideas for empathic ripostes. To understand Pace's contribution, notable features in his personal and professional life are discussed – biographical information, historical movements within the zeitgeist of late 19th – early 20th century influencing his career, religious disparagements about empirical psychology that he encountered, and a four-part apology, a portion of his overall rhetorical message. Moreover, applications for 21st century Christian psychology undergraduates and mental health professionals are delineated. [This is co-authored with Kris Pence, a former psychology major]

2016-2017 – PROTESTANT MILLENNIALS, RELIGIOUS DOUBT, & THE LOCAL CHURCH. Millennials are the most analyzed and populous generation in the United States. Collectively, they have been slowly re-shaping the American culture. Protestant Millennials, a subset of this generation, have been ruffling feathers in their local churches. Many, who once regularly attended, are leaving. Unwise responses by local church leaders to their young parishioners' doubting habits significantly contributed to the departure. This study pursued a sample of college-aged Protestant Millennials to know them in a psychological sense. The intentions were twofold: to discover social personality traits that predict their doubting practices and to develop practical and proactive relational strategies for local church leaders. Self-report data on personality features and doubt phenomena were obtained from 532 religiously committed undergraduates in the United States. Results from multivariate regression procedures revealed three social personality dispositions contributed to the prediction of the doubt constructs. Implications and applications of the findings are discussed.

2015- 2017 -- A HEART OF WISDOM. Twenty-nine years ago, a medical trauma kindled the beginning of a spiritual transformation. The ordeal started with a late-night phone call that was followed by several stress-filled, disheartening events over ten days. In short, my father's unexpected death from an undetected arterial complication became a prompt from God to number the days of my life and gain a heart of wisdom (Psalm 90:12). Description of Dad's final days and his life-threatening medical condition, a ruptured abdominal aortic aneurysm, are presented. Moreover, interpretative commentary on Israel's lament in Psalm 90, particularly verse twelve, and personal applications of the transformative effects of the prayer and my father's passing are discussed.

2012-2015 – CAREER DEVELOPMENT & FAMILY DYNAMICS. Restated this study could be titled: *The Relationship between Family Environmental Factors and Career Development*. The project seeks to answer these research questions: what relationship exists between family roles, family relational qualities, and family activities with career development constructs among religious undergraduates who are engaging in career exploration?

2010-2015 – **FACILIATATING EMOTIONAL AWARENESS IN A CAREER COUNSELING CONTEXT.** Using an intervention from Emotion-Focused Therapy during three interpretative encounters, this study ascertained from 451 undergraduates the kinds and frequency of emotion elicited by vocational options. The frequency distribution of 40,207 affective responses revealed interest, challenge, attraction, excitement, and satisfaction as the top

five recurring emotions. Practical applications of the emotional information in a career counseling context are also discussed.

2010-13 – SOCIAL PERSONALITY TRAITS AS SALIENT PREDICTORS OF RELIGIOUS DOUBT PHENOMENA AMONG UNDERGRADUATES.

Quest religion has been studied for over 35 years. But, little is known about how healthy it is relative to interpersonal functioning. This study seeks to discover the relationship between questing and social personality traits. Twenty-six years ago, Bergin, Masters, and Richards (1987) published results from a correlational study of Allport's two religious orientations with indices of pathology and social personality traits. Curiously, Batson's quest religion, a third religious orientation, was not included. The omission appears to accompany the unremitting uneasiness and confusion with religious doubt in the American Christian church. In contrast, the present study identified a set of mature and adaptive social personality traits related to doubt phenomena. Specifically, multiple regression analyses of questionnaire data from 642 religious undergraduates revealed four personality dispositions predicted quest religious orientation and theological exploration. Implications with and applications of the findings are discussed.

2010 – THE INTRUDER OF THE MIND: THE SCHIZOPHRENIC EXPERIENCES OF AN ADULT WOMAN: Over the course of twenty-one years, a woman's reason, emotion, and behavior progressively surrendered to schizophrenia. Almost a third of her life was like a twilight existence of bizarre delusions and hallucinations. These effects from the disorder unfortunately overshadowed her courage, the bravery marshaled to survive her battle with this cruel, untreated brain disease. This is a brief case study or a chronicle of the woman's journey; these are observations of how she faced the intruder of the mind.

2009-2011 --- EMOTIONAL INTELLIGENCE AS A SALIENT PREDICTOR FOR COLLEGIANS' CAREER DECISION MAKING: This investigation seeks to expand the sparse literature base on the relationship between emotional intelligence (EI) and collegians' career developmental journey. Toward that goal, I intend to answer three questions. How is emotional intelligence related to the career development of religious collegians? Would higher EI be related to a more clear and stable vocational identity, a more well-defined vocational personality, and minimal career indecision? Which facets of EI are predictive of vocational identity, vocational personality, and career indecision?

2005 — ADOLESCENT RELIGIOUS DOUBTING AND IDENTITY FORMATION:

Different ideological perspectives about religious doubting spawn controversy and confusion among some Christians. Typically misunderstood as unbelief, doubt is often characterized as dangerous if not outright prohibited by Scripture. This study sought to test whether comprehending religious doubting through the lens of identity formation offers a more nuanced understanding of doubt by taking into account a doubter's identity status and experiences in the formation process. Data was obtained from 604 youth using a questionnaire comprising an identity status and six religiosity measures.

2004—ESSENTIAL BIBLICAL ASSUMPTIONS ABOUT HUMAN NATURE: A MODEST PROPOSAL: In this project, I developed a compendium of seven essential biblical

assumptions. It is a modest proposal that lists and describes core beliefs on human nature. It intends to be sufficiently comprehensive offering a thorough view of biblical personhood yet also is appropriately parsimonious so that it is practical.

2002--RELIGIOUS SOCIALIZATION: This project entails looking at how family variables strongly related to religious faith. Applying developmental contextualism to religious faith, I employed structural equation modeling to test this framework and to find the relationships between family relations (e.g., cohesion, attachment, expressiveness), family activities (e.g., moral-religious, recreational, intellectual ones), and religious faith (e.g., spiritual maturity, spiritual well-being, religious orientation).

2000-2002--ADOLESCENT RELIGIOUS FAITH: The adolescent religious faith project has two sections. The first looked at the faith structure that emerges in adolescence using quantitative methodology. Borrowing from Fowler and Warren Heard's ideas, faith was operationalized with six measures (e.g., Religious Doubt Scale, Religious Well-Being, Spiritual Maturity, Religious Orientation Scale, Quest Scale) and than a factor analysis (principal component analysis) was conducted. The second part examined the effects of gender, age, and identity status on adolescent religious faith.

2001 **ADULT CHILDREN OF SCHIZOPHRIENIC PARENTS:** This project sought to discover the relationship between adult children's experiences with schizophrenic parents and the kind of adult attachments they currently create.

1999--LATE LIFE DEPRESSION: This project sought to suggest that the church could operate as an agent of help in the battle against late life depression. A practical program was suggested in the paper.
